UK EDUCATION SYSTEM EXPLAINED

According to the annual census conducted by the ISC (Independent Schools Council), there are now 554,243 pupils at ISC schools, up from 544,316 last year, an increase of 1.6% fuelled by both British and international pupils. Many factors influence parents choosing to send their children to a private school.

Sending your child to study overseas is a big decision and it is important to fully understand the structure and offering of each school. Boarding schools are those where students live on campus throughout the term and these can be both single sex or co-educational (both boys and girls). There is no conclusive evidence which suggests either is better educationally so this will be best decided by parents and

children based on personal preference. Here at Queen Ethelburga's we welcome boarding and day students from all around the world, both boys and girls.

In order to gain a place at Queen Ethelburga's your child will have to go through a comprehensive admission process.

Whilst many students will focus on results and league tables, there is so much more to a school than just results. Our experienced admissions staff will be more than happy to talk through the important factors you need to consider when choosing a school and give you an extensive insight to what we have to offer here at QE.

LOCATION

QE has a prime location in the heart of the Yorkshire countryside, in the North of England, geographically we are in easy reach of Harrogate, York and Leeds.

Once a kingdom in its own right, England's biggest county has never lost that sense of being special. A grandeur you don't get anywhere else, the power of its history and pride of its people make this a place where ordinary simply won't do. Yorkshire is most beautiful.

Ancient abbeys and castles, great houses and gardens are framed by high moors, wooded hills and lush farming country. Three National Parks, the Yorkshire Dales, the Peak District and the North York Moors, protect more than 1,000 square miles of matchless walking country. Yorkshire's vision changed the world. York, a Roman stronghold and Viking capital, is one of Europe's greatest cities. It is also stylish and fun – and under 2 hours by train from London.





York

The City of York is steeped in history. York has many world-renowned attractions to be proud of, including the gothic splendour of York Minster, the National Railway Museum, the Castle Museum and the Jorvik Centre, to name but a few. In addition to its many historical and educational sites, York is also a vibrant, cosmopolitan shopping destination. Modern department stores run the length of Parliament Street while the smaller craft, souvenir and antique shops can be found winding along the famous cobbles of "The Shambles" - the street which inspired Harry Potter's Diagon Alley.

The City also offers a huge variety of bars and restaurants, catering for all styles of national and international cuisine.

Harrogate

Harrogate's charm and character owes much to its heritage as a popular Victorian spa town. Modern Harrogate is a major international conference destination with a varied mixture of shopping, fine restaurants and relaxing open spaces. The town centre is decorated with beautiful floral displays annually and, with "The Stray", a vast expanse of 200 acres of green lawns with established blossom trees, Harrogate bursts into life every English spring to autumn. Other attractions in Harrogate include the RHS Gardens of Harlow Carr, the Royal Pump Room Museum, Mercer Art Gallery and the famous Turkish Baths.





Leeds

Yorkshire's 21st century capital, Leeds, offers everything you would expect from one of the UK's most vibrant cities. Leeds is the only English city outside London with its own repertory theatre, opera house and ballet companies. Leeds Art Gallery has one of the UK's best collections of contemporary British art (The Times) and the city is home to the Royal Armouries, the national collection of arms and armour. There are more listed buildings in Leeds than in any English city outside London, with highlights including the Victoria Quarter, Leeds Corn Exchange and Harewood House, a home with links to the Royal Family. . It has also hosted several international sporting events such as Le Grand Depart for the Tour de France.

Chapter House

Chapter House is for the youngest students at Queen Ethelburga's. It is home to children from 3 months in our Kindergarten and goes up to Year 5. Boarders are welcome from age 7, which is Year 3 upwards.

Chapter House is a modern and engaging school that focuses on providing an environment which respects, recognises and tunes into each unique child. There is an important focus on curiosity, creativity, collaboration and community to enable children to become independent learners who are ready for the next stage of their education.



With smaller class sizes, the children and staff build positive relationships so that each child feels supported and challenged individually in their learning.

Chapter House has its own school building, with its own Art, IT, Science and DT rooms but the children also use music, drama and PE areas in the other parts of the Collegiate. There are regular links with other departments, such as catering and creative arts teams, to enhance topic work.

- Each child has an individual learning pathway which is tailored specifically to them. This ensures that there is the correct approach to teaching which will support and benefit each child's style of learning.
- Chapter House offers regular outdoor learning opportunities for all age groups with a dedicated Woodlands areas and a Level 3 Forest School qualified specialist.
- A wide range of extracurricular activities, trips and visitors to the school enhance the curriculum – including our very own Reading Dog!

Our youngest boarders stay in our newest boarding house in Abbey Chambers. Wensley is the boarding house for our boys and girls in Years 3 to 5. The Chapter House boarding and academic staff work closely together to ensure that boarders feel fully supported whilst boarding at QE. The boarding house is a 'home from home' with a comfortable, homely feel and the opportunity to be involved in lots of fun activities on a weekend.



King's Magna

King's Magna is our Middle School, welcoming students from Year 6 to Year 9 (age 11 – 14 years) and offers a dynamic, happy and caring community.

The supportive and vibrant environment ensures students can grow and mature into their teenage years with confidence, by taking advantage of the many opportunities that are available to them. This unique school model ensures that each child is supported in the transition between primary education and the demands of GCSEs.

Small class sizes enable staff to devote maximum time and energy to fostering curiosity and ensuring that each student can make the most of their talents. Students enjoy the sense of belonging to a smaller school within the Collegiate; they have the chance to get to know each other and their teachers very well, and they flourish as a result.

King's Magna shares many facilities with the senior schools, enabling a wide and varied programme of lunchtime and after school activities, whilst providing a secure environment in which students grow in confidence.

From Year 6, pupils have specialist teaching for non-core subjects and from Year 7, students

enjoy a broad-based programme of study by specialist teachers for all subjects. All students are able to personalise their timetable with enrichment options which challenge students to take their learning beyond the curriculum. The introduction of option choices in Year 9 allows some specialisation in the curriculum and ensures a smooth transition to QE College or QE Faculty in Year 10.





Students enjoy some of the best boarding facilities that are on offer in the UK, supported by a dedicated team of Houseparents, who ensure that everyone is look after in a safe, happy and productive environment. King's Magna boarders can be in one of three houses – Year 6 and 7 boarding students are in Grassington, Years 8 and 9 boys are in Ingleton House and Years 8 and 9 Girls are in Richmond House.

Queen Ethelburga's College

The College at Queen Ethelburga's is one of our two senior school pathway options, offering students a traditional academic route through their examination years, for both Key Stage 4 (Years 10 and 11) and key stage 5 (Years 12 and 13).

Students follow a traditional GCSE or A Level pathway, alongside a diverse and engaging range of super-curricular and enrichment options. Those who choose to join QE College

in their senior years are strongly self-motivated individuals, have a pro-active approach to their studies and have an academic ability to reach their own high aspirations whilst at QE and beyond.

Life in the College is demanding, yet exceptionally rewarding, for those students who are determined to rise to the challenge. Enrichment options allow students to broaden and deepen their knowledge in areas of interest and focus, to ensure a challenging and stimulating experience.

You will have noticed alongside the traditional GCSE and A-Level options, we offer a selection of BTECs within our Faculty senior school pathway.

What are BTECs?

BTECs are vocational qualifications that are offered as an equivalent to GCSEs in Key Stage 4 (Years 10- 11) and equivalent to A Levels in Key Stage 5 (Years 12-13). Students on a BTEC course complete units made up of assignments, each of which provides credits towards the final grade. Some units are mandatory and some optional. There are also externally examined mandatory units.

How are they different from A Levels or GCSEs?

Level 3 BTEC courses combine externally assessed theoretical content with actual practical application. The fact that the BTEC course is assessed through both examinations and coursework make it popular with universities as its structure mirrors that of university style learning. In BTEC Business, students will study actual companies, carry



out mock job interviews, conduct business presentations, etc. In BTEC Sport, students will analyse actual sport performances, coach younger students and be assessed on their own sporting ability and improvements.

BTECs are designed to give students the skills they need to move on to higher education or go straight into employment. Classroom style teaching combined with project work and practical, work-related activities help to develop students' behavioural skills, which can include teamwork, creative thinking and presentation skills.

More employers and Higher Education institutions than ever before are choosing BTEC-qualified candidates for their academic and practical knowledge and skills, including Russell Group Universities where students have gone on to study Law, Business and Psychology, to name but a few, with a combination of A Level and BTEC qualifications.

Careers

QE Provides extensive careers education and support to our students. From careers lessons and university trips through to one-to-one interviews and bespoke careers advice, all of our students benefit from an experienced and qualified team of careers professionals. The careers team work closely with a number of higher education institutions, apprenticeship providers, employers and with the armed forces to ensure that students have the most up-to-date information and knowledge of career opportunities.

Our dedicated QE Futures programme is a whole school approach to careers guidance, aimed at supporting students to make informed decisions about their future. For those highly academic students intending to apply to G5 universities (Oxbridge, LSE, UCL, Imperial) or medicine/dentistry/veterinary courses, a comprehensive programme is offered to support them in submitting a strong and successful application.

Not only do the careers team work with students individually, they also present to different year groups throughout the academic year. These presentations motivate them to think about their futures and provide them with essential information on UCAS and various career options. The team engage students in Year 10 all the way through to Year 13 with the Morrisby program which provides ideas about potential careers that match their skill set and interests. This then guides them through the subjects they may need to take, allows them to search university courses and eventually allows them to write their personal statements on the portal as well.

Oxford and Cambridge are highly competitive world-class universities located in the UK.



UK Medical Schools are equally competitive. Good A Level grades are not enough to guarantee admission to one of these prestigious institutions. They have extra requirements including admissions tests, interviews, work experience, wider reading and research projects. These components require a lot of extra preparation.

For Oxbridge students, this dedicated programme consists of a combination of online and in-person tuition from experienced consultants and subject-specific Cambridge and Oxford tutors to maximise the students' chances of admission. Students also benefit from access to interview practice, admission test preparation, and small group meetings take place to discuss their wider reading and work experience plans to ensure they remain on track to produce a competitive application.

In addition, students benefit from visiting speakers, university trips and the university convention as part of our provision to ensure our students have access to the best possible information to guide them through the most important phase of their academic decision making.

King's Magna Intensive English Preparation Course – KMIEP

The King's Magna Intensive English Preparation (KMIEP) course is designed to help international students access the regular school curriculum and move forward in their education at the Collegiate.

What Each Course Covers:

In each course, students will learn a wide range of knowledge and skills. This includes improving their ability to speak, understand, and use English effectively in conversations, learning vocabulary specific to their subjects, and becoming better at reading and writing. The KMIEP will teach students how to



communicate well in both academic and social situations. It also lays the foundation for students to continue their studies at King's Magna and choose either the Faculty or College pathway.

Entry requirements:

International students who want to attend Queen Ethelburga's are evaluated based on their school reports, an English test given by their agent, a resume created by the student with the help of their agent, and either a Skype or in-person interview. Students will also need to complete a Cognitive Ability Test (CAT4) covering verbal, non-verbal, quantitative, and spatial skills.

King's Magna welcomes students across a range of abilities and looks for a positive attitude towards education and good behaviour.



If English is not a student's first language, they should be able to communicate well in everyday English.

For Year 6 entry, students should score 40+ in the Oxford Young Learners English Test. For Year 7, it's 60+, and for Year 8, it's 66+. Year 9 applicants should have scored 53+ in the Oxford Online English Test.

King's Magna Intensive English Programme (KMIEP):

If students need help reaching the required scores on the Oxford Online English Test, they will be offered personalised Intensive English Lessons.

Year 6 and 7 students can access the regular curriculum but will also receive an Individualised Education Plan. These lessons will be scheduled during the school day, including registration, lunch breaks, and afterschool activities.

Year 8 and Year 9 students in the Intensive English Programs (KMIEP) will receive extra English support and a modified academic schedule. This schedule will be created individually by the student's Head of Year and the Intensive English Program Lead.

Students will have the chance to take the Oxford English Test and IELTS exams to track their progress. Successfully completing these courses typically allows students to move up to the next grade level in the following academic year.

Faculty Intensive English Preparation Course (IEP)

The Faculty of Queen Ethelburga's Collegiate offers Intensive English Preparation (IEP) courses, designed for international students to develop their English language skills and to allow progression into one of our mainstream academic programmes.

The whole programme focus on the following 3 components:

- · Academic development
- · Personal development
- Cultural embracement

We approach our IEP programme with a Content and Language Integrated Learning (CLIL) approach. Research evidence shows that language learning is more effective



when it is combined with content learning in another subject other than the language being learned. It enables learners to encounter language in context and to use it for authentic communication. All these unique experiences on top of our English as an Additional Language teaching input will enhance students' language development.

Each one-year course covers a broad range of knowledge and skills, including oral communication, subject-specific vocabulary, and advanced reading and writing. Courses will equip you with the skills to communicate effectively in academic and social situations, and also provide the opportunity to familiarize yourself with an academically rigorous and highly demanding educational environment. From immersion in the QE and wider community, interacting with a wide range of nationalities, and participating in the many clubs and activities, you will not only develop a stronger command of English but gain a greater understanding of British culture.

IELTS/B2 First

A crucial aspect of the Advanced Intensive English Preparation course is the time spent developing a student's English skills. Up to 14 hours a week can be spent working towards both the B2 First and IELTS qualifications that demonstrate that students have the language skills to live and work independently in an English-speaking country or study on courses taught in English. They are widely recognised by universities are excellent preparation for Sixth Form academic study. Both the B2 First and IELTS courses improve and test students' ability to read, write, speak and listen in English.

Mathematics

Students will be studying towards AQA GCSE 8300 Maths 9-1 qualification. During this GCSE course, we aim to increase the students' confidence, consolidate skills and introduce new concepts at a level appropriate to their abilities.

Students will study a variety of topics in the key areas of number, algebra, ratio, proportion and rates of change, geometry and measures, probability and statistics.

Lessons will consist of a variety of activities in which they can use and apply their mathematical skills and enable students to engage with, explore, enjoy and succeed in mathematics.

Science

Students joining the IEP Science course will study key skills and fundamentals aspects of science in preparation for potential further study at a higher level. This course focuses on the development of key language for Scientific study as well as the building of core practical skills. Aspects of the Biology, Chemistry and Physics courses from Key stage 3 will be revisited and consolidated as well as the introduction of new content studies at Key Stage 4. Students will build their confidence, vocabulary, and investigative skills and begin to think and problem solve like a Scientist.

Physical Education

Students have the opportunity to develop their skills, knowledge and understanding in areas of specific interest to them. We offer an options system giving a choice of rugby (boys only), netball (girls only), football, hockey, basketball, badminton, boxercise, swimming, fitness, gymnastics, dance, trampolining, yoga, exercise

to music, spinning, athletics, cricket, zumba, softball, rounders, tennis and table tennis. These activities are designed to enable students to link higher level skills and techniques accurately and consistently with precision, control and fluency, and apply these skills and techniques appropriately in each activity.

Personal Development

In Personal Development lessons, students cover a breadth of personal, social, health, citizenship, careers and economic education. They will learn about topics that will introduce them to life in the UK including wellbeing and healthy lifestyles, relationships and sex education, financial capabilities, revision skills, and values and culture. The Personal Development programme has been developed to prepare the students for the challenges, choices and responsibilities of university, work, and adult life. They will undertake a variety of tasks and develop the essential skills of communication, teamwork, negotiation, leadership, and presentation.

Art

Choosing art and design on the IEP programme will give students the opportunity

to develop both their creative skills and language skills. Students who successfully complete the IEP art course will be able to achieve the GCSE in art and design/photography, move on to complete their GCSE in year 11 to be in a position to choose a BTEC in Art and Design Practice or Media Practice in year 12. The course is tailored to you, in order to allow you to develop your skills in interest in a wide range of creative areas, such as fine art, illustration, graphic design, fashion, photography and architecture.

In the first term you will cover the following before moving on to a themed GCSE style project.

- How to work through art and design project
- · Colour theory
- Shading and Tone
- · Formal element and developing your techniques
- The opportunity to try a varied range out outcomes and develop your own creative direction

Foundation Business & Enterprise

The IEP preparation course will include one level 2 enterprise component and a series of mini projects. It will give the students experience of coursework-based learning, working on mini projects, submitting to deadlines and getting feedback similar to BTEC assessment.


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The College – Advanced Intensive English Preparation Course (AIEP)

The AIEP course is offered within QE College. The AIEP is a 2 to 5 year modular programme which can be adapted to suit any highly academic student. Entry can be at any of three routes, dependant upon age, prior learning and English competence.

Students who require support with their English can take this one-year modular course leading on to either GCSE or A Level study:

QE College Aspire is a 2 to 5 year modular programme which can be adapted to suit any highly academic student. Entry can be at any of the 3 points dependent upon age, prior learning and English competence.





Entry requirements:

International students applying to join Queen Ethelburga's College are assessed on the basis of their school reports, an English test administered by their agent, a resume produced by the student under the supervision of their agent, and a Skype or face to face interview.

IELTS/B2 First

GCSE Mathematics

The GCSE Mathematics course covers topics in number, ratio, proportions, algebra, geometry, probability and statistics. The emphasis throughout the course will be on developing a stronger understanding of mathematics and its applications. The most capable mathematicians may also be able to work towards a Level 2 Certificate in Further Mathematics, offering the opportunity to stretch and challenge students in their higher level maths skills.

GCSE Biology/Physics

Students can choose from either Biology or Physics GCSE, depending on their prior knowledge and future aspirations. The biology course covers topics of cells, infection, bioenergetics, homeostasis, inheritance, evolution and ecology, whilst the Physics course looks at themes of energy, electricity, particle motion, atomic structure, forces, waves and magnetism. Both courses also include assessed laboratory-based practical work.

GCSE 3D Art, Business Studies, Chemistry or Statistics

Students with a stronger command of English may be able to complete one additional GCSE, replacing 5 hours of time spent improving their English. More details of these options can be found in the Key Stage 4 Options Book.

There is a wide range of sports and activities available including:

Basketball Cricket Tennis
Fencing Volleyball Trampolining
Gymnastics Dance Swimming

The sports provision is delivered from the high-quality sporting facilities on campus, with some of the best provision for training athletes in the UK.

The campus Sports Village is home to a 25 metre swimming pool, triple-court sports hall, fitness suite and free weights centre. Outside facilities include a four-lane cushioned running track and multi-use courts, in addition to over 30 acres of grass and specialist artificial pitches.

Performance Sports Programme (PSP)

The Performance Sports Programme (PSP) offers a higher level of coaching beyond playing recreationally. The programme is unique to the individual by offering a personalised learning syllabus to maximise sporting and physical development under the guidance of specialist coaching staff.

Health and fitness are a priority for pushing QE athletes to be the best they can be. The Performance Sports Programme provides rehabilitation and post-training recovery at our Sports Treatment Centre, where you have access to physiotherapy, soft tissue massage and strength and conditioning. You will also work with a nutritionist to teach you how to eat a healthy diet and aid your training.

There are five sports you can train at performance level:

- Football

- Netball
- Basketball
- Rugby

Is the Performance Sports Programme right for you?

The Performance Sports Programme is unique to QE Faculty (with an introduction in King's Magna) and is embedded within QE Faculty's community. You will work closely with the Academic Team to ensure that your academic subjects are manageable and are balanced alongside your love for sport.

Each student who takes the Performance Sports Programme is expected to follow QE's Hill Standard: "To be the best that I can with the gifts that I have". As such, student athletes are expected to push themselves academically and within their chosen sport. The team spirit runs throughout The Faculty's ethos with many student athletes representing the school as reps, prefects or in school councils.

Those who apply for the programme are expected to have a passion for sport, be highly competitive and play (or wish to play) at county level, or the equivalent in your home country.

Creative Arts

The Creative Arts Department at QE combines the skills and resources of the Art and Design department and the Design and Technology department to offer a fantastic learning experience and a range of subject routes that go beyond the traditional subject choices. Facilities include dedicated spaces for fashion, fine arts, 3D design and design technology workshops as well as in photography, a dedicated studio space and darkroom.

Students are introduced to art very early in the school and are encouraged to explore their creativity through a range of 2D and 3D media and to experiment with analogue and digital approaches to realising their artistic intentions.

Through Key Stage 3 these skills are developed through a wide range of stimulating tasks and, because of the experience, many students choose to continue to GCSE level study and beyond.





A large range of well-equipped rooms staffed by experts in their specialist areas offer routes through fashion, fine art, photography and 3D craft allowing students to choose from many different areas of focus from sculpture and painting to architecture and jewellery. They have the freedom to explore their creativity in accommodation that is inspirational and well-resourced, and the work produced, which is often award-winning, adorns the corridors around the school inspiring the next generation of artists and designers.







Performing Arts

The breadth and variation of opportunities on offer at Queen Ethelburga's for our Performing Arts students is a showcase of talent, diversity and inclusivity. The staff team, all trained in industry and all of which have worked professionally, bring a wealth of knowledge and experience in many different genres to our students.

The King's Theatre is the hub of Performing Arts at Queen Ethelburga's Collegiate. It is a full-scale professional venue with a seating capacity of over 300, which provides students with opportunities to perform to larger audiences and inspires in them, a love of performing.

As well as delivering GCSE Dance, GCSE Drama, GCSE Music, A-Level Theatre Studies, A-Level Music, BTEC Extended Diploma in Performing Arts Practise and BTEC Music qualifications, we focus on

extending our provision through additional lessons, co-curricular or super-curricular sessions covering:

- · Acting through song
- · King's Magna Choir
- Orchestra
- · Choreography
- · Music Theory
- · OE Choir
- · Pit Band
- · Audition preparation
- · Wind Band
- · Chamber Choir
- · Open Dance studios
- Peri lesson in various instruments and singing
- · Jazz Band
- String Group
- · Jazz/Street Dance
- LAMDA lessons
- · Backstage Crew

Our Performing Arts provision is rooted within our practice and knowledge in industry, and we regularly bring in professional actors to work with students and develop skills. We also run 'King's Academy for Performing Arts' which is a Saturday morning theatre school 'King's Academy for Performing Arts' where students aged from five years, train in all genres of the arts and showcase their work throughout the year.

Live performance is at the core of our teaching of performing arts. In an average year we produce three full scale theatrical productions: our annual 'Ghost Night' original - a site sympathetic spooky performance piece, a showcase piece and our annual Gym and Dance performance event. Altogether, audiences for these events can add up to over 3300 people.

We have significantly developed our ADA (Academy of Dramatic Arts provision) which runs in parallel to our Performance Sport Pathway. Students in KS3, KS4 and KS5 can



allocate areas of their timetable to training further in performing arts. In these sessions we offer extended provision in stage combat, dance technique, vocal techniques, classical acting and strengthening and conditioning. We celebrated four students achieving places at drama school last year and look forward to welcoming our next set of performers each year.

Many of our past Performing Arts students have gone on to study at acclaimed drama schools such as the Royal Central School of Speech and Drama, the New York Film Academy, the London Academy of Music and Drama (LAMDA) and the American Musical and Dramatic Academy (AMDA).



Music

Music is very much at the heart of Queen Ethelburga's and works closely with performing arts as an important element in the school's creative arts provision. Like many creative subjects, it is introduced very early in school so that we can encourage an appreciation of the learning and performance of music from a young age.

As students progress through the key stages, they learn more about instruments, music and performance both as solo performers and as part of an ensemble. We encourage students to work in analogue and digital media and to appreciate a wide range of musical styles to develop skills not only as musicians but also to appreciate the beauty of music and the benefits it can bring as a global language.

Music is delivered in spacious and well-equipped accommodation by a range of teachers and Instrumental & Vocal Tutors who are all experts in their specialist area, be that composition, performance, digital music or musical theatre. The musical performances of students throughout the year are exceptional. They act as an inspiration for others and form an invaluable part of the creative arts experience at the school.

QE achieved three awards in the Independent Schools Association (ISA) National Music Competition 2023; 1st place in the Senior Young Musician Competition and runner up in the Junior Young Musician of the Year competition. The school also received a Judge's Award in the ISA Musical National Competition.





CO-CURRICULAR ENRICHMENT

Alongside academic success, at Queen Ethelburga's Collegiate (QE) we aim to provide a holistic education which supports students to develop their knowledge, skills, and experience beyond the classroom.

An education at QE is all about learning through new experiences, trying new things and discovering what you enjoy and excel at. Through our enrichment programme our aim is 'to foster a spirit of adventure and discovery', which students achieve through Cultural Exploration, Skill Development, and opportunities for Personal Growth.



Curriculum lessons, Enrichment, Super-Curricular Activities and our weekend activity provision all contribute to providing students with a holistic education and opportunities for them to develop knowledge and skills and gain experience beyond the classroom in this important area of school life.

Through Cultural Exploration, students gain a desire to explore the world and develop understanding and empathy. They become curious, ask questions, make community connections, and help others through charity and volunteering. They become public spirited and develop a sense of self-worth and civic mindedness.

They become globally aware and make the most of opportunities to explore, becoming independent travellers who gain a deeper understanding of diversity and global culture. Students engender a desire for Skill



Development, becoming committed and dedicated to learn something new. They persevere and demonstrate resilience, determination and endurance when faced with challenges and they become proficient, develop new skills, master technique and support others to develop.

Personal Growth encourages students to develop leadership skills, demonstrate courage, maintain honesty and aspire to succeed. They take on leadership roles, such as ambassador or prefect. They have an awareness of right and wrong, lead by example and have a high level of personal integrity. They have aspirations, a purpose and sense of direction, and are an inspiration to others.

Enrichment Activities Programme

Our Enrichment Activities & Super-Curricular Programme provides many opportunities for students to take part in activities before and during the school day, in addition we offer a breadth of afterschool and weekend enrichment opportunities.

Each term, our comprehensive THRIVE Enrichment Activities Timetable offers students in Year 6-13 approximately 70-80 opportunities, across the three THRIVE Enrichment categories:

- · Skill development
- · Personal Growth
- · Cultural Exploration

Our THRIVE Enrichment Activities Programme includes various Super-Curricular opportunities for students in the College and Faculty. Our Super-Curricular Activities (denoted by (SC) on the programme) aim

to extend student knowledge and equip them with skills beyond the curriculum, allowing them to build a wider and deeper understanding of topics relating to specific career paths. Students can choose from options such as medicine or engineering, develop debating and enterprise skills, or simply build a wider and deeper knowledge of topics within a range of subjects including English, mathematics, languages, humanities, social sciences, charity and volunteering. Our THRIVE Enrichment Activities Programme changes twice per academic year. Students choose the number of enrichment activities they wish to commit to each term; however, we emphasise the benefits of learning outside the classroom and participating in a breadth of different enrichment activities to students. This is particularly key for students in Year 6-9 who take part

in our Enrichment Award.

Personal Growth Combined Cadet Force

The Combined Cadet Force (CCF) has an Army Section (Yorkshire Regiment) and a Royal Air Force Section, in which students can enrol from Year 8.

Cadet training is exciting and challenging and provides students the opportunity to learn new skills while taking part in a range of military-themed and adventurous training activities. For example:

- Drill
- · Marksmanship
- Leadership
- · Command Tasks
- · Flying
- Fieldcraft
- · First Aid
- Navigation
- Adventurous Training e.g., mountain biking, paddle boarding, climbing, kayaking.



CCF gives students a chance to make new friends and have fun and adventure in a safe environment. CCF provides students the opportunity to develop real life skills such as first aid and navigation, in addition to developing teamwork, confidence, leadership, and self-reliance skills. Cadet training is also linked to the Duke of Edinburgh Award.

The Army Section and the RAF Section focus on developing their individual specific activities, however there are also many aspects of training which are common to both sections. Training is split over parade evenings, training days and residential camps, courses and the opportunity for an overseas exercise.

From the age of 13 cadets can gain Pearson BTEC vocational qualifications in recognition of their cadet involvement, teamwork, leadership, and community skills. Cultural Exploration

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award is the world's leading youth achievement award, that nationally gives millions of 14 to 24-year-olds the opportunity to be the very best they can be.

Since it began in 1956, the Duke of Edinburgh's Award has been inspiring, guiding and supporting young people in their self-development and recognising their achievements.

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award is a personal programme of activities that can be completed at three levels:

- Bronze (for students aged 14 and older Year 10 and above) – 21 spaces
- Silver (for students aged 15 and older Year 11 and above) 28 spaces
- Gold (for students aged 16 and older Year 12 and above) – 7 spaces

At QE, the award is run at all three levels and students have the opportunity to progress

through each award or commence the Silver awards as direct entrants (subject to a greater volunteering commitment). The **Bronze** and **Silver** Award are achieved by completing a personal programme of activities in four sections. The **Gold** Award is achieved by completing five sections.

The sections are:

- Volunteering: Students give their time to support the school or wider community, e.g. visiting a care home or supporting sports day for younger children.
- Skill: Students broaden their knowledge and skills, e.g. learning to play a new musical instrument.
- 3. **Physical:** Students carry out a physical activity, e.g. football, swimming, tennis, netball, hockey, gymnastics etc.
- 4. **Expedition:** Students plan and complete a 2- or 4-day walking expedition, where they carry their own equipment, cook meals and camp overnight for 1-3 nights (depending on the award level).

5. **Residential** (Gold only): Students spend a minimum of 4 days away from home carrying out physical or volunteering based activities, with people they have not met before, e.g. students from another school.

Participating in the Duke of Edinburgh Award can be an incredibly enriching adventure. On the way, students will do their own exciting and challenging programme of activities to help them reach their full potential.

We strongly encourage students to participate in the Duke of Edinburgh Award at QE, as the benefits reach far beyond their positive experiences whilst completing the award. Future employers, colleges and universities value the Duke of Edinburgh's Award very highly and recognise an Award holder as being hard working, adventurous and exceptionally committed.

Charity Fundraising and Volunteering

Charitable fundraising is an important part of school life and allows the whole QE community to come together for an important cause. At the start of each academic year, all students and staff vote for the six main charities fundraising will take place for, meaning everyone has input in which meaningful charities we raise funds for each year.



Annual charitable fundraising events take place each year, including the Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal, Christmas Jumper Days, Rotary Shoebox Scheme Appeals and Toy Collections and the Collegiate's on-site Race for Life in aid of Cancer Research UK, which involves every student from Nursery to Year 13! We hold four Academic House Charity Weeks and students and staff in Chapter House plan exciting fundraising events for Children in Need and Red Nose Day each year.

We also regularly organise events to raise valuable funds for various other charities throughout the year, in addition to the six main charities. This is often in response to suggestions put forward by students, staff, parents and contact from local charities. These have included large-scale Gala Dinners, bake sales, non-uniform days, MacMillan Coffee mornings, Easter Egg and Valentine's Rose gifting.

We have a dedicated group of student volunteers who form attend our Charity &



Volunteering Afterschool Activity. This group meet weekly afterschool to discuss, plan and implement charitable fundraising and service initiatives throughout the year.

At Queen Ethelburga's, we encourage as many of our students as possible to participate in volunteering, both on-site and in the community.

Examples of volunteering opportunities include:

- · Animal care
- Assisting with school events, including Outreach events with local primary schools and community groups

- · Beach cleans
- · Becoming a buddy or peer mentor
- Community projects local, national and overseas, e.g., painting/gardening/ maintenance
- Creating Christmas cards and writing letters to local care home residents
- · Food bank collections
- Health/Sport Leaders, including whilst hosting on-site inclusive sports events e.g. Panathlons in collaboration with North Yorkshire Inclusive Sports
- Shipment container loading trips to a local charity which recycles mobility equipment, before sending it overseas to countries in need
- Supporting village events and local organisations, such as preparing Ripon Cathedral for its annual Candlemas Event
- Supporting in the school libraries
- Visiting local care homes to chat to the residents and host games/quizzes


Many of our students also organise volunteering projects independently, as part of their Duke of Edinburgh Award (DofE) volunteering section.





Outreach

Trips

Our Academic Day and residential Trips aim to extend learning beyond the classroom, in environments that spark curiosity and passion by bringing curriculum topics to life! Every year group, from our youngest in Chapter House to our Sixth Form, have the opportunity to access an academic, curriculum-focused day trip. Over 100 Academic Day Trips and a programme of exciting residential trips are provided each year to enrich the students' academic experience at QE.

Weekend Activities

At Queen Ethelburga's Collegiate, alongside academic success, we encourage students to participate in experiences beyond the classroom. Students, both day and boarding, are encouraged to participate in activities at the weekend. Off-Site Weekend Activities encourage students to form new friendships outside the classroom or boarding house,

and gain many new skills, all of which enriches their holistic development and experience here at QE. Such experiences will contribute to students' personal development and involvement in the QE community, all of which will bolster the university or employment applications of our senior students.



A wide selection of off-site activities are available to students in Year 3-13 to suit all interests. Our students regularly attend local attractions such as the cinema, bowling alley, a variety of restaurants and the trampoline park. Visits to cities in the locality allow our students to explore a wider range of attractions and shops, as well as exploring the history of places such as York Minster, Durham and more urban areas like Leeds and Manchester.

Alongside our local off-site visits, students can participate in our Full Day Excursions which offer the opportunity to travel further afield to visit popular attractions across the UK. This year's Full Day Excursions allow students to delve into the word of Harry Potter at the Warner Bro's studio tour or visit all the spectacular attractions that the seaside resort of Blackpool has to offer; journey up to the top of Blackpool tower, visit the famous ballroom and meet all the celebrities immortalised within Madam Tussauds!





LIFE AT QE

Boarding

We firmly believe at Queen Ethelburga's that it is vitally important the students living onsite with us as boarders, feel like QE is a home from home. Having a staff of Houseparents who are professionals in their role, rather than teachers duplicating roles, really does make a difference to the happiness of the students, as they come away from school at the end of every day.

A varied programme of house activities, QE toast time tradition, baking at the weekends, cookery evening and student run socials are just a few of the experiences our boarders have the opportunity to take advantage of – all with other students who are likely to become lifelong friends.

Within the boarding houses the student voice is very important, and we run several groups to ensure our provision caters for all. The Boarding Prefects, comprising of Student Voice representatives, Food Council and QE Eco

Warriors provide regular feedback to the QE Boarding Management Team with regards to activities, socials and the rules in house.

Student Wellbeing is at the forefront of our boarding provision. All our students are assigned a Boarding Mentor at the start of the academic year who meets them regularly, on both a one-to-one basis and in small group settings.

With social occasions throughout the year for all boarders, QE has additional opportunities to teach social etiquette and to celebrate the diverse cultural traditions of our boarders. We believe that it is important to recognise the important moments within the variety of cultures that make up QE and find that our international club remains one of the most popular boarding clubs every year. During club

sessions, students come together weekly to discuss different cultures, explore cuisines, share experiences and celebrate different festivals.

Every boarding bedroom is provided with a timer-controlled plasma TV, mini-kitchen with fridge, a hair dryer, iron and board, wash hand basin, heated-towel rail and fan. All bedrooms are air-conditioned and have their own individual, private en-suite bathroom with toilet and shower.

Sixth form students share apartment style accommodation, in preparation for the independent style of university accommodation.

All our boarding houses also provide cosy communal areas for socialising with friends, activities and relaxation.



Our students are at the heart of what we do, and we strive to provide opportunities for them to develop their own skills in social behaviours, communication, self-reflection and collective responsibility. We believe that these abilities allow students to leave us as effective contributors to society.

QE offers support and guidance to all students and parents to ensure that we are all working to support individual students needs and equipping them with the right skills, not only to be successful in education, but to excel in their chosen career and life in general. We are focused on developing our students' skills and resilience, whilst nurturing their personal wellbeing. We have a dedicated team of trained staff on call 24 hours a day to offer support and guidance to all students within a specialist welfare area.

Our wellbeing timetable focuses on the five ways to wellbeing and is a student-driven set of sessions that focus on the promotion and development of positive mental health. Sessions run every day from our wellbeing centre and students can be referred to sessions or can drop in as and when they are needed. The programme is based on interventions to support students' mental health, wellbeing, and happiness. It is a flexible system that is reviewed regularly and offers initiatives such as peer mentor support, 'woodland and wildlife', dealing with stress, emotion management and 'tea and talk'. Sessions are designed to foster relationships built on trust, enabling collaboration, cooperation and a positive learning environment that ultimately empowers all at QE to thrive.

It is well documented that a good wellbeing offering in schools improves student motivation, attainment, and productivity, creates more quell-rounded individuals, and reduces the need for disciplinary intervention. Not to mention. that unlike preparing students for the next assessment, which inevitably is a shorter-term goal, providing students with education and facilities linked to wellbeing and mental health helps create individuals who benefit from improved health, creativity, work prospects, happiness, and their future relationships with others." I am confident that staff are always ready for you. If you message them on Microsoft Teams for anything or if you go into Pastoral, like when I was on the verge of crying and I wanted to speak to someone, within 2 minutes I was in an office talking with one of the team. I don't know how it works but there is always someone there and I really appreciate it."

They comfort you and remind you that what you're feeling is allowed and justified. Even if it was the stupidest thing you were feeling, they will always reassure you that you are allowed to cry at what you're feeling, like you're always allowed to feel that way about any situation."

You go in and talk and they remind you that your feelings aren't isolated — lots of other people have felt that way. Talking over tea and coffee — it's just so comfortable!"

International Liaison Officers

In addition to our extensive pastoral care, accessed by the whole community we have a dedicated team of International Liaison Officers who provide a specialist support role for our students joining QE from across the globe. They will care for new students on

The team can offer support for anything the student may need but we find the most common areas of adjustment include:

Food

Often the largest change is the food, and although we have a distinct international flavour to our menu options across the week — we will work with students who are finding the adjustment a little more challenging.

When I first came, it was a big change, especially the food compared to my culture. I lost a lot of weight and they talked to the chefs to make food that reminded me of home so I felt like eating properly."

Weather

Our uniform shop is stocked with coats, scarves and hats, all in line with school



uniform policy, to ensure that our students are dressed appropriately for the weather. We also offer many local trips to shopping destinations, where students have the opportunity to pick up some of their own clothes for weekend wear.

Culture Shock

We appreciate that it can be a big change moving to a new country. We have specialist training courses offered to staff each year to make sure we can support our students to the highest standard. We have offered specialist language courses to staff, as well as the Content and Language Integrated Learning qualification (CLIL) in which many are now trained.



STUDENT WELFARE

All staff across QE are responsible for safeguarding our students. Karen Howells-Lee is the Member of the Collegiate Board with responsibility for Safeguarding and Student Welfare.

Karen works closely with Daniel Machin (Principal), Erica Papaglimis (Head of Student Welfare and Personal Development (Designated Safeguarding Lead), and Jemma Holroyd (Head of Student Wellbeing), to ensure that the Collegiate provision and support remains exceptional.

We want all our students to feel safe and secure, which will enable them to focus on their academic life and the enrichment opportunities available to them. We aim to work with parents and develop relationships based on respect, trust and responsibility to support happy and confident young people who understand the impact they have on the school and the wider community.

Under our Student Welfare team we support students in a variety of ways, ensuring that they are getting the support they need to be at their best every day:

Learning Development

Our Learning Development team support all students to access their academic studies and ensure they have the necessary support and level of challenge. Our team work with students on a one-to-one basis, in the classroom and in supporting with examinations and access arrangements. All students have access to the Learning Development Department which seeks to develop the learning of all students, through offering support and opportunities which strengthen each student, irrespective of ability.

Personal Development

Personal, Social, and Health Education (PSHE) at Key Stages 1,2,3 and 4 helps students to



lead confident, healthy and responsible lives as individuals and members of society. Through work in lesson time and a wide range of activities across and beyond the curriculum, students gain practical knowledge and skills to help them live healthily and to deal with the spiritual, moral, social and cultural issues they face as they approach adulthood.

Medical Centre

Our Medical Centre is open 08:00-18:00 Monday to Friday with evenings and weekends staffed by our team of First Response Emergency Care (FREC) staff. The Medical and FREC teams take responsibility for the general medical care, health and wellbeing needs of the community.

The school Medical Centre houses three assessment rooms, four dedicated medical bedrooms, a waiting room and reception. You can be assured that whilst on campus our students receive excellent medical assistance should they require it.

FREC staff are responsible for emergency first aid care across the site between 18:00-08:00 weekdays and 24 hours over the weekend. They are highly-equipped beyond the traditional first aid qualifications, to deal with a huge array of medical emergencies.

International students have access to emergency health care under the National Health Centre (NHS) and will not be charged for hospital treatment or further medical treatment during their studies.

School Counsellor

We have a dedicated School Counsellor, who is a trained therapist. During counselling appointments, students are encouraged to talk about their feelings and emotions with the counsellor, who will listen and support them without judging or criticising. The counsellor can help them gain a better understanding of



their feelings and thought processes, and find their own solutions to problems. Students are able to request to see the counsellor or may be referred via the Wellbeing and Welfare teams.

Independent Listener

We also have an Independent Listener, available for all our students. The listener is a person outside of Collegiate staff who students can speak to privately about personal problems or concerns. Students are able to request to see the listener or may be referred via the Wellbeing and Welfare teams.

Student Voice

We believe that the voice of our student body plays a vital role in ensuring our provision is the best that it can be. We have a variety of opportunities for students to provide us with feedback about life here at QE. There are over 350 students involved in the current student voice groups that support us with the planning and decision making about how we run our school.

All these groups meet regularly with staff to provide ideas and feedback and they work closely with their peers to provide the leadership teams with valued opinions.

ADMISSIONS PROCESS

1. Application Form and Documentation

If you wish to make a full application to the school, we ask you to complete an application form. This can be obtained from our Admissions Office, one of our in-country representatives or one of our international agents. Along with the completed application form, we ask you to submit the following:

- A copy of your child's passport
- A copy of the last two years' school reports
- Any certificates of achievements etc. that may assist in your application



Once step 1 has been completed andhave the necessary documentation we can then issue instructions on our entry tests. International students will be required to complete the following as part of their application:

- · An online Oxford English test
- · Cognitive Ability Test (CAT4 Test)
- · Personal Resume
- Personal Interview either in-person or online

The testing is done online. They will require invigilation so we need to contact a current school, agent or test centre to administer the tests.



Once step 2 is complete, then Queen Ethelburga's will make an offer, if you meet our entry requirements.



If your application is successful, you will receive an offer detailing the course you have been accepted to, the start date and the termly fee for your course. Applications are made at no charge to you, but if you want to accept a place at QE, a registration fee of £295GBP will be required. In addition, the overseas refundable deposit is equivalent to one term's full fees. You will also receive a registration form, and full details of the fees to be paid.

Dependent on your start date, the process will either continue immediately or pause until the Easter before your September start date.

3. Receive Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS)

In order to apply for a Child or Student Study Visa you must have a CAS – Confirmation of Studies letter, issued by Queen Ethelburga's Collegiate.

To generate a CAS letter, the following documents must have been fully

completed, submitted and approved by the QE Admissions Team:

- · Copy of Passport
- Copy of Birth Certificate
- TB Certificate
- · Guardianship Form
- Parental Consent Form
- · Receipt of first term fee

The minimum stay at Queen Ethelburga's is one full academic year or the length of the course stated within the offer letter. CAS statements will be issued after the 5 April, in the school year of entry, for September starters. CAS statements are valid for 6 months, however, can only be submitted for grant of Visa to the immigration officials 3 months in advance of study. They are issued via email with a unique reference number which will be required for your visa application.

4. Student Visa Application

Once you have your CAS letter, you can make your visa application with UKVI.

5. UKVI Visa Vignette

Once the visa process is complete and the study visa approved, the UKVI will issue a Visa Vignette. The Vignette is a sticker that the visa centre place inside the passport. It enables you to enter the UK and activate your student visa.

Your vignette will need to be stamped by an Immigration Officer on arrival. Any student arriving to the school without their vignette stamped must be able to produce proof of travel in the form of a boarding pass. Without this you could be asked to leave the country and re-enter.

6. Biometric Residency Permit

Once the student has entered the UK, you will be issued a Biometric Residency Permit (BRP); this will replace the Vignette and be collected by the QE Admissions Team for safekeeping. When a pupil leaves the UK for vacations, or completion of studies, the school will hand them their BRP card to travel.



INTERNATIONAL ADMISSIONS – THINGS TO NOTE:

Guardians

It is our policy that ALL students, including Sixth Form (Years 12 and 13) whose immediate parents live abroad, must have a UK based Guardian. This is mandatory to comply with the UK's 'Young Persons Protection Guidelines'.

Professional guardians must be members of AEGIS or accredited by QEGUK. If you have a family friend in the UK taking on this role, they must not be acting as a guardian for any other student, whether at QE or any other educational establishment, and they must not be making a financial charge for any of their services in looking after your child. Further conditions and documentation will be required, for which we will send full details as part of the admissions process.

NHS Surcharge

International students have access to emergency health care under the National Health Centre (NHS) and will not be charged for hospital treatment or further medical treatment during their studies.

You will be asked to pay a mandatory Immigration Health Surcharge (IHS) during the visa application process.

Private health insurance is not mandatory.

Still wondering if QE is the right school for your child? One-Year Experience and One-Term Taster Courses

At QE, we recognise that there are students who want to come to the UK and experience what life is like at a top British boarding school, experiencing everything from academic subjects to creative arts, sports, and the range of enrichment activities and trips on offer. We also understand there is an increasing number of students that want to 'try before they buy' and get a taster of the experience before they commit to it fully. At QE we can offer One Term Taster Courses and One Year Experiences to students looking for a short term high quality course.

Who is it for? Students looking to come to the UK for an immersion experience at a British boarding school or a taste of life at QE.

How long can I stay? One term is the minimum stay, and they can choose to extend that time whilst they are with us.

Age? Available from age 7, up to 17 years old.

Year groups available? Year 3 to Year 12

Language Level: We have specific requirements depending on the age of the student, but we do offer a broad range of courses for various abilities.

Students are placed into their year group as though they would be staying for the full time with us. This allows students to be fully immersed into life at QE and treated equally in the classroom, whilst still recognising they will have their own aspirations to achieve while they are with us.

English language provision allows students to continue to develop their language skills, and where possible, students will be able to sit IELTS and Cambridge English exams with us.

We understand this may be a students' first experience of boarding, so we provide exceptional support from our dedicated boarding Houseparent team, and our student wellbeing team, offering pastoral care around the clock 24 hours a day. Students will have 'buddies' when they come to help them acclimatise, along with our student peer mentors making sure our students settle in and feel comfortable. All rooms are shared with up to 3 students per room, and all rooms have en-suite facilities along with more than enough storage space and a safe for any valuables.

In their time with us, students can experience everything life at QE has to offer, including all the activities, sports and trips they are able to try. The majority of enrichment activities take place on our campus on the rural Thorpe Underwood estate, meaning that students maximise their time at school developing their skills outside the classroom, as well as within it.





Entry criteria

We offer a range of options that students can sign up for, depending on their academic ability and their English language level. Students with good language skills will join our mainstream school, whilst those with lower levels of English that would like to focus on developing these skills can take advantage of our IEP programmes (page 39). These courses can be co-accredited to make sure that students who need to formally recognise what they have learnt with us, are able to do so.

Students who join us for a short term, will gain a great time from their time in a boarding school. Students can improve their English by making friends with native speakers, develop confidence in using their newly acquired language skills – whilst also gaining knowledge in different subject areas that will supplement their studies in their home country.
